Seeing each other later	À tout à l'heure ! (See you later!)
Ending a text	Bisous ! (Kisses!)
Going home	Rentre bien ! (Get home safely!)

✓ **Sounds natural:**

Bonne journée, bisous ❤️

2. When You Miss Someone

English speakers often translate directly. French speakers usually choose softer expressions.

Instead of always saying:

Je t'aime.

You might hear:

- **Tu me manques.** (I miss you.)
- **J'ai pensé à toi aujourd'hui.** (I thought about you today.)
- **J'ai hâte de te revoir.** (I can't wait to see you again.)

- **Tu me manques déjà.** (I already miss you.)
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3. Before Going to Sleep

Common messages between couples:

- Bonne nuit ❤️
 - Fais de beaux rêves.
 - Dors bien.
 - À demain.
 - Je pense à toi.
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4. During the Day

Natural WhatsApp messages:

👋 Morning

Coucou 😊
Bien dormi ?

☕ Lunch

Tu manges où aujourd'hui ?

🏠 After work

Tu rentres bientôt ?

❤️ Evening

Hâte de te voir.

These are exactly the kinds of short, natural exchanges you'll hear every day.

5. Giving a Compliment

French compliments are usually simple and sincere.

Instead of trying to sound overly romantic, try:

- Tu es adorable.
- J'aime ton sourire.

- Tu me fais rire.
- J'adore passer du temps avec toi.
- Tu comptes beaucoup pour moi.

Common Mistakes English Speakers Make

✗ Using **je t'aime** in every affectionate situation.

✓ French speakers often express love through everyday care rather than constant declarations.

✗ Calling everyone **mon cœur**.

✓ This nickname is usually reserved for romantic partners or young children.

✗ Translating English expressions word for word.

✓ Learn the phrases French people naturally use instead.

✗ Speaking too formally.

✓ Real conversations are usually short, relaxed, and simple.
